Message From The Principal

This column is released on the Thursday before College exams begin on Wednesday 22 August. If you are a parent of a child in Years 11-13 at our College then they should be studying for their school exams next week. Nearly all our students will have some form of exam, although they are less prevalent in vocational courses.

These exams serve three functions. Firstly they provide the learner, their whanau and College

staff with an indicator of the students' readiness for the NCEA exams in November. Because these exams are 2.5 months before the 'real thing' there is enough time to catch up on any gaps.

The second aspect is that they serve as a 'wake-up call' to those students who have a relaxed attitude towards study!

The third function of these College exams is that they are the reference for those students who may need a 'derived grade' in November. A derived grade is the consideration given to those students who, for some unexpected reason, cannot sit the NCEA exams. For example, last year we had six students who required this assessment, through a variety of unfortunate circumstances. In those cases the students were awarded the grade they were given in their College exam. Obviously if the school exam results were poor, due to a lack of revision or lax work habits, then the student was 'stuck' with this grade.

It is interesting, also, how even exams are having to change with the times. In this year's exams students are forbidden to wear watches because so many watches now are internet capable. The other change requires our exam rooms to use digital clocks rather than analogue, due to the fact that a considerable portion of today's teens cannot tell the time via a traditional clock. This will no doubt generate some wry smiles and/or disbelief amongst our grandparents.

Subject Selection

At the moment we are in the midst of our subject selection process for 2019. This applies to all students as they make choices for the following year. Can I urge students and their parents or caregivers to discuss carefully their choices because the choice of subject often determines

It is important that these choices are returned within the timelines, because from these returns we make choices about which subjects will operate.

May I acknowledge a former staff member who has gone 'above and beyond' the call of duty, and retirement. Many of you will remember Dave Christensen who retired at the end of 2017. Dave has returned to help us for a few weeks as the relief teacher in our Kōhanga class, before our new appointee is able to start. What's best of all is that he does it with a smile! Well done and thanks!
