PRINCIPAL'S REPORT



Ehara taku toa, i te toa takitahi, Engari, he toa, takitini

This whakatauki translates to mean "Success is not the work of one but the work of many".

Ashburton College has a reputation for long term success in a variety of areas including: academic, sporting and cultural. However, it is always important to acknowledge that these successes are brought about by many people rather than a few. This whakatauki is closely aligned with the well-known notion that it takes a village to raise a child. This year is no different, with some significant milestones to celebrate. We are also embarking upon a journey involving whole school change that will equip our students with the skills and dispositions to enable them to thrive in the future. This school transformation is a long-term challenge that will be faced by all secondary schools throughout the world. We understand that knowledge is accessible anytime anywhere and this requires that our future graduates have a set of skills and dispositions that enable them to be successful in the future.

As a new-comer to the region, I have been hugely impressed with a number of things firstly, the sporting and cultural opportunities available to our College students. These come in a huge variety and the level of support from both parents and staff is extremely gratifying. This year there has been many sporting highlights led by our rowers who achieved 5 gold medals at Maadi Cup. This team effort was spearheaded by Veronica Wall and her achievements were recognised with her selection for the New Zealand Junior team. However, these athletes benefited from a fantastic team atmosphere and their achievements were made possible by the quality of their programme and coaching. Many thanks to Justin Wall in particular. Other sporting achievements included the Senior Girls' B netball team winning their grade and our Girls' 1st XV defending their title with a resounding victory in Timaru. I enjoy my time on the sideline at many sports events and it's always gratifying to note how well our teams represent our College and the fact that they enjoy such significant levels of support. A second feature that stands out is our involvement in many cultural events. The shining example of this occurred at the start of the year when I attended the AshDance Festival. We had all manner of dance from traditional Scottish to contemporary Indian to Filipino hip-hop all of which were well received and supported by the audience. One of the great things about Ashburton is that we are becoming increasingly multi-cultural and the acceptance of your background is a positive feature of our College. Other cultural successes included our Kapa Haka group doing us proud at the Flava Festival. Our ultimate cultural success though has to be our dominant performance at the 2017 Stage Challenge. Not only did we win the overall title in Christchurch but we also scooped the pool by winning most of the individual categories. It was a shining example of project-based learning and student input.

Another feature of Ashburton College that has impressed me, is our pupils' willingness to be friendly and open. In November last year I had been appointed, but not yet started at the College, and I came to visit for a week. I was hugely impressed with our Year 9s and 10s who were universally willing to smile and acknowledge a new-comer in their midst. They didn't know I was going to be their new principal but everybody was prepared to look you in the eye and to acknowledge you as a human being. This is a real life skill that is not universal in all secondary schools and I would just like to acknowledge this feature of the College culture. It is an exciting but challenging time ahead for all secondary schools throughout the world. We do know that the traditional model of acquisition of knowledge is becoming less relevant for the future world. This is because anybody can access information via Google, Siri, YouTube etc. Increasingly, learners need to acquire a set of skills and dispositions that will enable them to thrive in the future; these include: creative problem-solving, the ability to communicate and to collaborate and, most importantly, to think. Nobody knows what the future of employment will look like in 30 years' time; however, we do know that these soft skills and dispositions are essential for tomorrow's workforce. All schools are aware of the need to transform themselves to benefit future learners. Part of the challenge as Principal, is not only to provide programmes that equip your learners but also to bring your staff and your community along with you so that they understand the need for change. Therefore, I would like to acknowledge the hard work and dedication of my staff this year. They have embraced the idea that change is coming and that we need to change in the interests of our learners. This will be an ongoing process but I thank you for your efforts and willingness to consider change in 2017. The other group I wish to acknowledge is our Board of Trustees. They have been hard working, professional and also willing to challenge themselves to alter our programmes to meet future needs.

Most students now spend 13 years at schooling in New Zealand. I would like to finish with two tales that demonstrate the pace of change. In 2004 there was a global challenge established with a million dollar first prize to any company who could build a self driving vehicle that could negotiate a 50 mile course. All the best and brightest institutions from around the world entered this contest. No one claimed the prize and the furthest any vehicle managed to get was 7 miles. 13 years later self drive cars already exist and are functioning and self drive trucks are in development and will be a reality on our roads.

In 13 years' time it is highly likely that an 18 year old will not be required to sit a driver's licence. The pace of change in innovation will mean that self-drive cars are a reality, as they provide a cheaper, safer option for our community. My thanks to all those who contributed to our success throughout the year. It is an exciting time to be in education and I look forward to the challenges ahead.



Matthew also completed the Coast to Coast course in a very fast time of 3.34:18 to comfortably win the Secondary Schools' section, but also placed an impressive second overall behind the winner, who completed the event in 3.25:42.



The afternoon was spent drawing and photographing at the Museum. Museum personnel kindly provided access to some





We will display the finished L1 and L2 folios after moderation later in Term 4.







Ashburton College Library: Te Whare Pukapuka Matauranga



As the words rang around the Horncastle Arena on Friday night, ninety students from College screamed and cheered and felt very proud that they had accomplished something of note.

Top Awards Received

Claire Bubb, Head of Senior School, and Drama teacher with overall responsibility for supporting the student production, said that 'not only did we win first place, but also took out ten Awards of Excellence and the coveted Spirit of Stage Challenge Award for being the school that best exemplifies the values of the competition.

When initially posed the question 'What one message do you want to share with the world?' the Stage Challenge production team didn't really have an idea to begin with; until we saw the image of a young Syrian boy washed up on the shores of Kobani. This one image sparked the discussion process between the students with one question that was coming through louder than everything else; "Why is no one speaking up?!". With this thought in mind we then started to develop ideas about the way we could truly add to the conversation about the Syrian Refugee Crisis - to communicate the story that started our own conversation. Through the directorial skills of Joe, Maddy and Prue, as well as Lily and Laura's choreography, we told the story of that young Kobani boy as he and his family escaped a war-stricken country; throughout the treacherous journey across the sea, and of his parents as they find a new life after the death of their child.

After months of hard work the day finally arrived for us to showcase our performance at the Christchurch Open Night performances. As the last performance ended, it was time for the judges to make their decision. The audience was moved to tears, as was one of the judges who commented 'well done on your bravery to explore such a hard hitting image. We all saw that image, but to actually make us process and workshop that at a really deep level, was confronting. It was visually stunning, powerful, poignant and compelling'. The Stage Challenge media release said, that all three event judges

were astounded by the level of performance, production and design presented on stage by Ashburton College. Specifically, Design Judge Jo Domigan said "Ashburton presented a visually beautiful piece".

The day was filled with many laughs and memories we will not forget, one of those being when James Jenkinson became overjoyed with excitement from the day and decided to attempt to do the splits – this, however, did not go as planned and he unfortunately ripped his pants....

On a more serious note, we would like to thank former College student, Anna Raukawa, who came in to mentor our student choreographers, and the teachers who accompanied the group on the big day itself: Nicky Lewis (who also designed the set pieces), James Jenkinson and Danielle Coulter. between Euripides and Aeschylus as to who will be brought back to life to save Athens.




Xanthias and Dionysus, at a standoff over Dionysus' plans to go to the underworld ruled by Hades.

KOHANGA

The Kohanga began in Term 2 to provide the opportunity for 8 Year 9-10 boys who were struggling to follow behaviour codes in the mainstream school setting and weren't engaging in learning or had poor school attendances.

The top floor of the Netball Pavilion was transformed into a classroom, its proximity allowing the boys to opt to attend some classes where they had built a relationship with the existing mainstream class teacher.

The ethos of the Kohanga was therefore to work on building social and life skills through a variety of activities and to use the skills of community organisations to change those behaviours often seen outside of the school, and to learn to leave those behaviours behind when they walked in through the school gates each day.

This has been done by the use of Digital Learning following the Te Kura courses in Numeracy and Literacy, accessing activities in the community such as boxing and at the EA Centre, and inviting skilled personnel to come in and work with the boys in smaller group settings. We have also had several combined trips with our

Community Entry Programme such as skiing and paintballing, using these as a reward system for positive engagement.

The boys have learnt to cook, with the support of our wonderful LSA 'Jenny' and look forward to sharing a meal together each school day. During Term 4 the YMCA are running a course called the Resiliency Toolkit each week and we are focusing towards a team effort to do a 'Camp' at the end of the term.

The reward for me as the Kohanga teacher is to see all 8 boys still enrolled at Ashburton College and working hard to make the change to be engaged learners.

Classical Studies Trip

It was dream come true for 12 College Classical scholars and their accompanying teachers who embarked on the Classical inaugural Studies trip to Greece and Italy. The trip arranged in conjunction with High Hillmorton School who also had 12 students take part. Students took in key ancient

sites, sculptures and artworks as part of their studies. Naturally, in Greece, the Acropolis was a highlight, as was Mycenae, home to the historical figures of Agamemnon and Klytomnestra, key players in the Trojan story. Olympia also proved to be a highlight, with some students electing to run the 192m that was the keystone event of the ancient Olympiad. Situated high in the alps on the Peloponnesian peninsula is Delphi, an ancient site of worship to the Greek God Apollo. This, too, captured the imagination of the students who marvelled at the feats of engineering.

The Italian leg saw the students visit the ancient site of Pompeii. It was a site that exceeded expectations, particularly visits to The House of Faun and The House of Veitti, which has remained shuttered for the better part of the

last 20 years due to excavations and work being done on the frecoes. A visit to Italy wouldn't be complete without a trip to the Colosseum and, this too, saw jaws drop in amazement. Rome bustled, but careful and well-planned guidance by Classical Studies teachers, Mrs Greta Hampton, Hillmorton's Ms Kylie Coulbeck and Hillmorton's seasoned classics trip and History teacher. Mr Geordie Dann, meant time in Rome was maximised to take in the sites and museums such as The Vatican Museum, The Capitoline Museum and, of course, The Parthenon. The trip concluded with a visit to Venice, a visit that contextualised the influential role the Venetians played throughout the Meditteranean, and especially Greece.

the weather was cold, with cloud and wind around

Arrival at Mt Cook started with a presentation from DOC personnel, on glaciation in the park, followed by a trek up to the Red Tarns (1165 steps worth, according to Mr Fougere). Rising steeply from Mount Cook Village, the Red Tarns Track leads to a set of alpine pools suspended high above the valley floor, with the top of the trail featuring spectacular views of Mount Cook and its surroundings.

Finally, on reaching the top, the weather cleared and the class set about collecting their data on the scree slopes.

Geography teacher, Annie Lees, said that Friday dawned to a mammoth frost and a fantastic blue sky day, offering some amazing photo opportunities.

The group undertook a three hour jaunt up to the Hooker Glacier Lake and back, which was followed by a presentation, at the DOC Centre, on the impact of humans on this high country environment. The staff said they had a great bunch of students to take away, saying they were 'awesome'.

Year 13 Field Trip

College's Year 13 Geography students left Ashburton for Kaikoura, at 8:00am on Wednesday 17 May. Geography teacher Annie Lees said they faced a rather dire-looking weather forecast, and had to travel the inland route through Waiau but said 'it made a change and did not actually take much longer, but was just not quite as scenic'. This year, with the closure

University of Canterbury Laboratory, the group stayed instead at the Canterbury Lodge Underwater Torquay Street, which was not quite commercial the kitchen available in the previous accommodation, nor quite the same views, but it was clean, well-maintained and suited the purpose.

The weather was cold and overcast as the group headed out to undertake the first

two beach profiles, an exercise which required some very hardy souls getting wet – thank you Bryn, George and Cameron.

The seals were not all completely co-operative or willing to share their beach with us but the students got the job done. As we progressed around the peninsula the wind dropped and the day was gorgeous.

back to base, with all feeling a bit weary, but there was less work to do this night, apart from tidying sketches.

Friday morning saw a few more exercises looking at spit formation, then it was cleanup time and on the road home, arriving around 5:30pm. An appreciative thank you is given to former

Head of Faculty Pete Fougere (who came out of 'retirement' to help) and Sakura Smithers for their help. Coastal processes now have taken on more meaning for the students, as they have seen the results and landforms they produce. The results will be evident via an internal assessment and the in-field knowledge used for the external exams at the end of the year.

History Trips

Year 11 Trip to Holocaust Centre

During the last week of term, on Wednesday 05 April, two Year 11 History classes travelled to Papanui High School in Christchurch to take part in the Holocaust Centre of New Zealand's Outreach Programme.

History teacher Greta Hampton said that the students have been studying the concepts of conflict and justice and, as a part of this study, looked at the origins of World War II, the rise of Hitler and the subsequent persecution of the Jews.

A very meaningful part of the day was listening to the testimony of a second-generation survivor of the Holocaust. The Nazis had persecuted both his parents, and his father was a survivor of Auschwitz-Birkenau Concentration Camp. The students found the day both informative and very moving and asked many thoughtful questions. Greta said that it was a pleasure to take away such a passionate and respectful group of students.

Year 12 Trip to Wellington and The Great War Exhibition

History teacher Amanda Grigg says that a group of ten Year 12 History students, also with teacher Greta Hampton, had a very early start

to fly to Wellington for the day on Monday 03 April. With the flight leaving Christchurch at 7.05am, doing the maths it was a fairly early morning rise and shine!

The group caught the Airport Flyer to Courtney Place and from there made a short walk up Tory Street to the New Zealand War Museum to see the Great War Exhibition and take in Pukeahu National War Memorial Park.

Tour Guide Andy led the group, for the next ninety minutes, through the exhibition. Amanda said that they 'emerged into Ypres Belgium, the cobbled streets taking us back to 1914 and from there followed a narrative of Will a young British soldier who had signed up to serve in the war'.

Each major section of the exhibition was dedicated to a year during the war and the displays were phenomenal. Students got to experience scales of the battlefields and look at the sheer size of tanks used and the inhumane conditions brave men and women were in.

The Gallipoli section contained a Peter Jackson display of a battle during the Gallipoli campaign, and the thousands of tiny painted soldiers had the students in awe. Large panels contained information of those men and women sent from our local communities. The last stop was the Hall of Memories and the Tomb of the Unknown Warrior, then it was back to Christchurch and south to College, ending the huge day around 6.15pm. Appreciation goes to Amanda Grigg and to Greta Hampton for their work in planning the trip, and to the students who, in the words of Amanda, 'were simply awesome'. It was a big day, but they were engaged, responsible and positive young people of Ashburton College.

Year 13 Field Trip

Undertaken on Friday 17 March, Year 13 History teacher Amanda Grigg, with staff members Mark Gleason and Greta Hampton, left Ashburton

at 7:30am to make their first stop at River and then on to the Hill Top lookout point to take in Onawe Peninsula from high. Due to this being the site of the historic battle between Ngai Tahu and Ngati Toa, and therefore being tapu, all wet their foreheads before walking up onto the peninsula itself.

Here, students heard about the strategies used by both chiefs: Te Rauparaha and Takatahara, in attack and defence. Students were able to acknowledge, though high strategically for Ngai Tahu defending it, once caught there was little escape. Hundreds were massacred in one day and students heard that Ngai Tahu was given back the land through the Waitangi Tribunal, following which they then decided to allow the public access.

From the Peninsula the group made their way into

the Akaroa township and looked at the physical differences between St Patrick's Catholic Church, The Trinity Church (Presbyterian) and St Peter's Church (Anglican). How religion and church was part of the early settlers' lives was also talked about.

The group also visited

the first French Cemetery for the settlers, and discussed the discrimination between the different European settlements when it came to the religious denominations. The lunch stop and cafes on offer in the town were enjoyed by the students. This year the Akaroa Museum had more in the way of informative displays, including touch screens and access to photocopy important primary sources written during the 19th Century. Students were able to take advantage of this for their research internal assessment on an aspect of 19th Century Banks Peninsula, due at the end of Term One.

Following the Museum visit it was a look around the beach area and discussions about the whaling industry, leaving close to 3:00pm and having a much-deserved ice cream break at Little River.

Science Trips

Year 12 Physics Visit Rutherford's Den and Canterbury University

On Tuesday 20 June, Ashburton College Year 12 Physics students and seventy students from other schools, visited Canterbury University and Rutherford's Den in the centre of Christchurch.

Throughout the day the group looked at different aspects of atomic and nuclear physics, ranging from Ernest Rutherford's gold foil experiment, right through to investigating radiation. At Rutherford's Den, Margot Person took us through three mini-workshops. The tour began in the original lecture theatre in which Ernest Rutherford studied, where we took a look at half-life and radioactive decay. The group then moved on to looking at the assassination of Russian journalist Vladimir Litvinenko. He was killed by a radioactive isotope called Polonium 210 when it was dropped into his cup of tea.

Next the tour moved downstairs, to an interactive classroom where we learnt about Rutherford's model of an atom and his great gold foil experiment. Rutherford did not believe Dalton's and Thomson's theories of the structure of atoms and carried out the famous gold foil experiment. This involved projecting alpha particles at a thin sheet of gold foil where he discovered that, in fact, an atom is greatly made up of empty space as the majority of the particles went directly through the gold foil. After completing the workshops at Rutherford's Den, we headed to the university where Clifford

Franklin gave the students an insightful lesson on radiation, and did some hands-on investigations using beta and gamma sources of radiation. Cliff also informed the group on what they should expect if they were to study areas of physics at university and I think it is fair to say that there may be a few more of us considering that pathway as an option for our futures. Everyone enjoyed their day and came away with a more in-depth understanding of atomic and nuclear physics that we can use in our up-coming internal assessment.

Year 13 Biology Students

Field Trip to Portobello Marine Studies Centre: Over the three days, students were tasked to produce their own experiment and to ensure the validity and accuracy of each and every one. Each student produced their own unique and individual hypothesis on the effects of a change in the environment on P.elongatus ('half crabs'). Students learned valuable lessons throughout the three days, including the importance of confounding variables when it comes to experiments. It also provided the students with an insight of what it feels like to do their own experiments at a university level and provided opportunities to develop skills that could be useful for possible future careers in biology.

The Marine Centre is managed by Otago University, with the team running the education

programme being from the university. College students worked with Otago University PhD students. The students were also able to interact and learn about the physical and physiological aspects of the local marine wildlife, mainly with the half crabs.

With around thirty students on the Field Trip this meant that around 300 crabs were used for the experiments. However, before the students were entrusted with the crabs they were lectured on the importance of ethics. Ethics are the moral principles that govern a person's behaviour when conducting an activity; with the interaction with the crabs, this required the students to be able to understand the basic rules of ethics when it came to handling animals. One of the more important lessons that the students learned was the importance of ethics when it came to experiments. Does the harm that the animals experience outweigh the outcome of information that we are able to learn from it?

As well as learning from the experiments, the students were also able to relax and enjoy each other's company within the accommodation, at the Holiday Park. After a long day of science, the students were able to enjoy the science-free environment and enjoy banter within the shared cabins. Particularly, on the first night, the students were in charge of cooking and preparing the meals which allowed the class

to be able to bond and build memories of the experience that was the three-day long science period.

However, like all good trips, it had to come to an end. On the last day, the students spent the time recording, finalising and ensuring the validity of their results so that they could continue and provide a conclusion once they had returned back to school. Overall, the trip was interesting and a great learning experience for everyone, and provided a sense of achievement for everyone involved in the trip. Tim Rodriguez

In the canteen, we were able to introduce regular gluten-free sushi; a whole variety of bakery products such as: muffins, pies and sausage rolls; and helped develop a system with Mrs Beach and Jo Keen so that students could order custom-made sandwiches, bread rolls, pita pockets etc. In the colder months, we helped with running the 'Breakfast Club' along with some volunteers, distributing free hot-chocolates and hash-browns to students before school every morning. We are well on the way to fulfilling the previous committee's goal of creating a display board for the canteen so that students are aware of all the different food they can get at the canteen. We printed out many pamphlets at the start of the year and distributed one to each form class so everyone knew what was on the canteen menu. We hope that next year's committee build as good a

relationship with Mrs Beach and Jo as we have this year, and help them in continuing to build upon the great service and quality of the food at the canteen.

Our biggest project for the committee this year was running the 'Litter Free' and 'Get Sorted' programme. With the help of Sheryl Stivens, we were able to get 30 commingled recycling bins funded for the school. We created a presentation – the 'Get Sorted' programme – to present to all year groups. We taught them how to use the bins; what impacts rubbish had on people and the environment; created a quiz whereby people had a chance to win items such as drink bottles, containers, and t-shirts, from sponsors who helped the school and Sheryl to get the free bins. In conjunction with the 'Get Sorted' programme,

Ms Carrick was able to create and develop a scheme so that most form classes had an area they had to keep litter free, hence the scheme Litter Free AshColl. The other classes were instead responsible for keeping the recycling bins clean with no rubbish. The cleanest area and the hardest working form classes had a chance to win a free fish and chips lunch at the end of each term, thanks to Mr Preece's funding for the prize. We hope that next year's committee keep this going and develop more ways to improve it. An idea for next year could be introducing compost bins in the garden and utilising the garden. So far, the programme/scheme has been working very well but this, everything the Environment Committee achieved this year, couldn't have been done if it wasn't for everyone involved. From Mrs Bubb and Mr Kelland, to the Student Exec for supporting all our ideas; to Richard and Warren (the caretakers) to Mrs Beach and Jo; Sheryl Stivens, Justin Bloomfield and Ms Carrick. We must also thank the teachers who allowed us to present our proposals to the student community during their assemblies, and to the students who volunteered to help with Breakfast Club. Also, we would like to thank the businesses who provided us food to trial and have for lunch, to the librarians who allowed us to print and laminate posters using their own account, and of course to my own committee - Jewel Pantaleon, Rosie Twamley, Lisa Drummond, Lanelle Millar-McArthur, Flynn Taylor, and Oskar McLauchlan. Thank you for helping the Environment and Canteen Committee achieve so much this year.

Mary Buckland:

Mary's association with College spans forty-three years, initially being employed as an Assistant Teacher of Physical E d u c a t i o n , with some

Mathematics. This soon progressed to her wellknown position as Teacher of Mathematics, a subject she is passionate about. Mary has taught via a mixture of full and part-time hours and, by 2004, she was Assistant Head of the Mathematics Faculty, and Acting Head of Faculty during one period of time. Mary is a highly competent, well organised teacher with a huge resource of knowledge and a strong awareness of students' individual learning and specific needs. Mary is also known for her consistent wearing of a 'Pi symbol' brooch, the purpose of which is a complete mystery to non-Mathematicians! As both a teacher and Assistant Head of Faculty, Mary is highly regarded. Up-todate with trends and developments in teaching and assessment, her writing of schemes of work has been invaluable to the Faculty, and appreciated, as was her work with the Literacy initiative within the Faculty; involvement as a Calculus Scholarship Mentor through an

AorakiNet VideoConferencing initiative, and representation on a number of in-College Standing Committees. From the early days of computer influences in schools, Mary has been a committed learner and user of the computer in the classroom, being described as very 'computer savvy'. In 2009 Mary undertook the position of NZQA Principal's Nominee for Ashburton College, with the rigorous and exacting responsibility for managing the assessment and examination system in the College, and its links and reporting to NZQA. Mary's effectiveness in the NZQA role was specifically noted in an NZQA Moderation Report.



Peter Fougere:

Peter's 42 year tenure with A s h b u r t o n College began in 1975, firstly as assistant Teacher in Social Studies, with Geography and History. A

characterising feature of Peter's teaching and student relationships has been his professionalism with a human touch, empathy for students, a sympathy for the under-dog, an awareness of different learning styles and the ability to treat each student as an individual. He is an effective teacher who influenced consistently good examination results, and some time Scholarship successes. Peter progressed from teacher to PR1 (position of responsibility) Social Studies in 1979; to PR2 in 1986; Acting Head of Social Studies Department during 1991; Head of Geography Department in 1993; and Acting Deputy Principal for two terms in 2003, and one and a half terms in 2006; while his role as Head of Faculty Social Sciences began in 1996. His passion for, and knowledge about, the outdoors enhanced Field Trips and the 'real' hands-on knowledge able to be gained by students as they learnt about (the previous) rocky shores in Kaikoura, pre-alpine heights up the Rakaia Gorge and at Mt Cook and, in earlier years, through involvement in 3rd and 4th Formers' Outdoor Training programmes, which operated then. In College Pete was part of the timetabling team from 1978-1982 and a Year Level Tutor for twelve years. Well-known for his love of rugby Pete was the College Boys' 1st XV Rugby Coach from 1976 through until around 2010 - this is an amazing 35 years' contribution, a huge commitment of personal time and a contribution which benefitted and positively influenced so many students.



Trevor Cochrane:

Forty-one years ago, in February 1976, Trevor began as Assistant Teacher of Physical Education at Ashburton College, beginning what was to become a

long and quality input into the life and work of this school. Trevor was also a first-day pupil of the then newly-formed Ashburton College, in 1965, where he started as a 3rd Former. A New Zealand athletics team member to the 1974 Commonwealth Games and the New Zealand Games in 1975, Trevor gave back to innumerable students as College Athletics Coach, for fortyone years. In this role he coached nine College athletes and eight College Relay Teams to National Honours. On a personal front Trevor still holds three Senior College athletics records! His career progressed to appointment as Head of Department in 1986 and Head of the Health and Physical Education Faculty in 1998. Added to this, in 2003, was the position of Head of Recreation and Sport, via which a successful and inclusive Sport and Recreation Programme has grown. College major sports events - particularly swimming and athletics sports - have run incredibly smoothly thanks to Trevor's thorough organisation and hours behind the scenes. Linked with these events were his fourteen years on the Ashburton Community Pool Board, as College liaison, and Chairperson of the 2011 New Zealand Secondary Schools' Cross-Country Championships held in Ashburton. His careful, meticulous, thorough and knowledgeable planning - whether for the classroom, for College sports events or training of individual athletes, combined positively with his long-standing student-centred approach to learning. Schemes and resources were wellorganised, evaluated and reviewed regularly; and staff and student relationships strong and valued. Trevor knew his students well and, as a result, good connections were developed and students respected him. With his Faculty staff he was always prepared to explore methods to increase engagement and positive outcomes for all students

Alison MacGregor:

Thirty-five years Alison ago, as Guthrie. and having just from graduated Teachers' College with Distinction, Alison - also a former student

of Ashburton College - accepted an Assistant Teacher in Commerce position in January 1982. Alison has taught in full-time and part-time capacities since that time. Alison progressed to Assistant Head of Commerce Department in 1990, being solely in charge of Shorthand - and

then to Head of Department - a position she held for close to ten years. Included in Alison's subjects were keyboard skills, 'typewriter' related commerce subjects, NZ Law, Office Technology and Accounting. While at College, Alison completed a Diploma in Specialist Subjects, established the Office Technologies new 7th Form (Year 13) Course, prepared many resources and transitioned with ease as 'Commerce' morphed into 'Digital Information Technology' and the Department's title transitioned from Commerce to Business Studies. Alison worked hard to establish a Word Processing facility and helped drive the establishment of T5 as a computer laboratory. Alison asked the same high standards of students as from herself, which results reflected. As a teacher she was meticulously prepared and planned, and skilled at targeting lessons to the relevant student level. Alison was a teacher of experience and impact, with a sound curriculum understanding used for the benefit of students. Alison contributed also to the extra-curricular life of the College through her interests of hockey, cricket, golf and squash, and particularly as coach of the Girls' Cricket Team for many years and, in latter times, a period of years with the College Golf team. The interestingly historical term of 'Sports Mistress for Orange House' outlined another in-College responsibility in her earlier years here!

PHYSICAL EDUCATION

Year 12 PE Adrenalin Forest Challenges

On Monday 08 May Physical Education staff members Sue Johnstone and Karen McKenzie, and another 'captive' retiree Trevor Cochrane, took a group of sixty-five Year 12 Physical Education students to Adrenalin Forest, located at Spencer Park in Christchurch.

The day's programme gave students the opportunity to test their skills and fitness levels on the High Ropes Course. The Level 1 Course starts at 2 metres off the ground, while the Level 6 Course is 30m off the ground. The cool easterly breeze meant that the students on the Level 5 and 6 Courses certainly noticed the trees swaying. The obstacles also increase in difficulty

as the height increases, and all courses end with a Flying Fox. All students completed at least two courses and some managed four courses. Levels 5 and 6 can take as long as 60 minutes to complete.

Around one-third of the group had been to Adrenalin Forest before but, for the rest, it was their first experience.

On return, the students were to analyse the risks involved in High Ropes and complete an assignment, in order to gain 3 credits.

Annual Year 13 PED Assessment Duathlon

The annual NCEA Assessment Duathlon for the

Year 13 Physical Education

students was held during the last week of Term One, on Tuesday 11 April. Phys Ed Teacher Ron Carlson said that twenty nine students lined up at the start in good conditions, despite the forecast for the day. The event consists of a 3.3km Run around the Allenton Rugby Grounds and the nearby gravel road. This is followed by a 10.6km Cycle predominantly on the river

Following this, apart from a two week Christmas/New Year break, it was full-time school for them, although they did have the

opportunity to visit Berlin.

All school lessons the students were in German. Amy indicated she 'learnt a lot more German', which was endorsed by Simon who described the time away as a 'good experience, where they saw and learnt lots'. Cassandra appreciated 'learning more German, a lot about the culture and how things are in Germany, plus the experience of travelling.

The advice of Amy, Simon and Cassandra to students considering such an option is to 'definitely go for it, enjoy', saying it's a 'once-ina-lifetime experience', and that it was fun.

ASEAN German Olympiad (Goethe-Institut, Thailand)

Six New Zealand students were selected to represent New Zealand in this inaugural ASEAN German competition. After passing her FIT in Deutsch A1 Examination, Emily Armstrong (Year 11) was eligible for consideration and was selected by the Goethe-Institut, Wellington,

to be a team member. Emily travelled with the other competitors to Bangkok, where they joined in with ten other countries from around Asia for a variety of German language and culture competitions. The weeklong programme also included opportunities to become acquainted with the Thai culture. Emily did exceptionally well and won a Gold Medal in the A1 grade. She made many new friends across many countries and had to work hard at her German in this immersion type event.

The inaugural Ashburton College Junior Chess Champion Trophy was won by Andrew Phimester. This tournament ran during Term 4, 2016, and was concluded after the 2016 magazine went to press.

Canterbury Secondary Schools Chess Competition 2017

The College had two teams competing at The Canterbury Chess Competition 2017, one in each of the two grades. The teams travelled every Thursday evening to Christchurch to play at Canterbury Chess Club rooms.

The A Grade team of Chrizia Cayanan, Keno De Leon, Jonathan Cabanatan and Henry Chapman found the competition tough and finished up 5th of the 6 teams competing. The best individual performer was Keno with three out of five wins.

Match results were: vs CBHS 1 – 3 Loss, Burnside A 1 – 3 Loss, Riccarton 1 – 3 Loss, Burnside B 2 – 2 Draw and St Bedes 4 – 0 Win.

The B Grade team of Andrew Phimester, Sam Chamberlain, Josh McIntyre and Aidan Soal produced some better looking results overall, but they, too, ended up finishing 5th, albeit in a much more even competition. Aidan was new to competitive chess this year and made considerable progress gaining 6 wins out of a possible seven. Sam also did well with five wins. Match results were: vs St Andrews A 1 – 3 Loss, 2 – 2 Draws against Christ College, Burnside C and Burnside D and wins against St Andrews B 3 – 1 and Cashmere 4 – 0.

Interschools

The College played two inter-schools this year against Burnside and Lincoln High School. In the match against Burnside we managed a better performance than in the regular competition but still went down 6.5 to 9.5. Keno did particularly well with 4 wins out of four. Aidan was joined by newcomers Rob and Hunter Corbett, but all three found the going tough.

The match against Lincoln went our way 22 – 10. Henry and Andrew both scored 6 out of a possible 8, whilst Keno and Jonathan managed 5 wins each.

Aoraki Chess Power Championship

Eleven players headed south to Timaru to compete in these championships. A Swiss system that kept our own players apart from each other led to some interesting pairings and it meant that many players ended up on the same points with final placings determined by a countback

system. Our top four players scored enough points for the team to finish first overall. Keno was our individual top performer with 6/7 and a third place finish Chrizia won the award for top female, scoring 5/7. New to the representative arena was Brendan Fleming

and he made a very good impression with 5/7. Henry, Aidan, Sam and Andrew also chimed in with 5/7 each. Josh and Rob finished on 4/7.

South Island Championship

This annual event was held in Ashburton and the College team acquitted itself beyond expectations. Coming off a disappointing Canterbury Championship season where the College finished behind all of the other competing Christchurch teams, a couple of personnel changes were made, with pleasing results.

The team recorded wins against John McGlashan College (3.5 - .5) Roncalli College (3.5

- .5), OBHS B (3 – 1) and Burnside B (2.5 – 1.5). There were 2 – 2 draws against Burnside A and CBHS. The only loss was to the victorious OBHS A team by 0 – 4. Overall the team finished 3rd, and would have finished second if it had managed to turn one of the drawn matches into a win. Individually everyone played well. Top Board, Keno De Leon, recently crowned College Champion for 2017, scored 4.5/7 as did newcomer Brendan

Fleming. Playing on Board Two, Chrizia Cayanan scored an impressive 4/7, with one of her games drawing applause at its conclusion as Chrizia cleverly negotiated a win with just 10 seconds to spare on her clock. The second addition to the team, Andrew Phimester, chimed in with 3.5/7 in a solid debut.

Whitelaw Memorial Rook

This year's David Whitelaw Memorial Rook competition to determine the College's Chess Champion for 2017 promised to be a tight struggle. The title was vacated this year with the departure of long time Champion, Vlad Barbu. Although the team structure allowed for a seeded tournament, it was by no means clear who would come out on top.

And so it proved with matches determined by the 'best of three' scoring system 15 of the 23 tournament games went to three or more games. Keno De Leon (Yr12) was top seed and made it to the final with a win over Brendan Flemng in one semi-final. In the other, Andrew Phimester caused something of an upset in

defeating Chrizia Cayanan. After 4 games Chrizia finally overcame Brendan 2.5 – 1.5 to claim 3rd place. In the plate final Henry Chapman proved too strong for Aidan Soal winning 2.5 – .5.

In the final Keno proved to be too strong for Andrew and ran out a comfortable 3 – 0 winner in the best of five series.

The main four subjects are Metalwork, Woodwork, Graphics and English. But in the first term you also complete your Level 1 First Aid, a welding course, Site Safe course and a construction course.

One of the best parts of trades was the practical experience we gained through the course. Every Wednesday, from the end of Term 1, to until the end of the year, we go out and work for a company in the trade we had the most interest in.

For the first 10 weeks, we got to try all the different trades, to find what we liked the most. Some options included: Building, Joinery, Electrical, Mechanics, Plumbing, Flooring, Painting, Baking, Forestry, Panel Work and many more. Once we had tried these out, we chose our favourite trades and did a 10 week block with the same trade/company.





SADD

In 1985, students at Mahurangi College were shocked by the number of teenage road deaths. To create awareness and bring about positive changes, SADD was created. Students Against Dangerous Driving empowers young Kiwis to prevent loss and injury on the roads. The vision is that youth will adopt safer attitudes and behaviours when stepping into a car.

Ashburton College have taken this further by holding two annual events, Road Crash Day and SADD week, in order to push the message across and really emphasise the consequences if roadrules are not followed. SADD Week is a week full of different events. On Monday, local business, Roscoes dropped off a crashed car to be used as a visual display on the chessboard, which made students come face-to-face with a potential consequence of dangerous driving.

9 students, and one Year 10 team; all teams competed well and our Year 10 team (Brendan Fleming, Ryan Robinson, Penny Stilgoe and Hayley Dickson) took 2nd place, after an exciting tie-breaker against Roncalli College.

Year 9 teams did well to earn 5th and 6th placings. Team members were: Easterlin Faamausili, Matthew Hopkins, Michael Lin-Nguyen, Tia McCallum, Gemma Taylor, Lauren Taylor, Dante Vannini and Jacob Swan.

These were impressive results as there were twenty-six teams competing at each level. All our students competed with great enthusiasm and spirit, and this was reflected in the excellent results.

Mathematics Week

Maths Week is a premier mathematics event in the New Zealand school calendar and once again students at

Otago University Junior Mathematics Competition

This competition for students in Years 9 to 11 is administered by a manager from within the Mathematics and Statistics Department at Otago University. The competition attracts over 10,000 entries from about 250 participating schools each year. This year Penny Stilgoe gained a Merit award.

Australian Mathematics Competition

The Australian Mathematics Competition (AMC) involves students in more than 30 countries attempting the same problems. In recent years the competition has been available in two formats (online and paper), allowing even more students to participate worldwide. The AMC is for students of all standards. Students are asked

to solve 30 problems in 75 minutes (Years 7–12). The problems are designed to test mathematical thinking and questions are designed so that they can be answered just as quickly without a calculator as with one. The problems get more difficult through the competition, so that at the end they are challenging to the most gifted students. Students of all standards will make progress through the problems, and also be challenged along the way. This year Penny Stilgoe, Dante Vannini and William Wallis gained Distinction and seven other students gained



Initially it was announced that our team had finished 6th overall. However, after some teams that were penalised with time faults protested, the Ashburton-Mt Hutt team results were adjusted to 8th overall.

On a very wet Wednesday 5th April a team of hardy equestrians competed in the Canterbury Interschool Dressage Competition at McLeans Island in Christchurch.

Josh had an exceptionally busy meet, often finishing one final and marshalling immediately afterwards for his next final. Josh finished with top six places in every event he competed in and gained 100% Personal Best swims. Josh has also qualified for the New Zealand Age Group Championships in multiple events and will line up with the best age group swimmers in the country later this month.

Whilst none of our swimmers returned with medals, all put together some strong swims. Our most successful swimmer and the only one to make a final was Year 13 student Rikuya Shibahara, who was just outside his best time for 8th place in the final of the boys' 16–18 years 200m butterfly in 2:12.45.

A further highlight was a great swim from Josh Giles in the 100m freestyle. Josh qualified for nationals just 2 weeks prior after an outstanding showing at the New Zealand Division 2 Championships. He took 0.61s off his previous best time in the 100m freestyle to place 20th in 58.31.

The morning began with leaving College at 7:40. Not knowing what to expect, the girls went ahead with it and put their best effort forward on the day. The College took eight boys and three girls.


The end result saw put the boys placed second, with our combined Ashburton College/Mountain Veiw team losing the final against Timaru Girls' High School.


Over the weeks that the girls practised, you

Later that day, we managed 120 in 20 overs, based around Ravenscroft's 55. However, their best bowling and fielding display of the trip followed and the boys bowled the opposition out for 90.

In the final tour game against Sunshine Grammar, AshColl had the home team under pressure at 31 for 3 early on, though they went on to make 214. Hunt was the chief destroyer with five wickets. The annual trip to Loburn to play at the prestigious Willows cricket ground followed. Playing against them this time were former pupils Kieran Hunt, Scott Punselie and Michael Burton, as well as current coach Mark Reid, former coach Dennis Mably and former Black Cap Paul McEwan.

Batting first was always going to be tough on a green wicket and only three players reached double figures – Tom Ravenscroft (12) Sam Hall (13) and Ben Niles with 22 in the team's total of 84. Graham picked up two early wickets, including his coach, to have the Willows in early trouble but with Burton anchoring the innings and McEwan showing his class, the Willows recorded a comfortable five wicket win.

Next up, was St Andrews 2nds, which saw one of the better batting efforts of the season with 201 based around opener Ravenscroft's 73 and solid contributions from Hunt (20), Hall and Niles (17) and Buchanan with 14.

It went right down to the last over with AshColl


